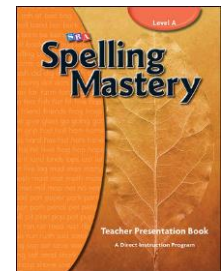


Do your students need help with spelling, reading or writing?

Direct Instruction programs work. They are the epitome of mastery learning and abundant research demonstrates their effectiveness.

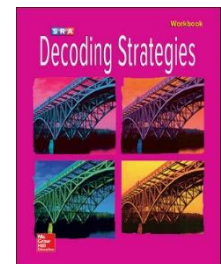
These programs:

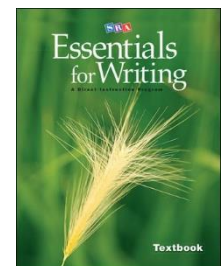
